2013 PROGRESS REPORT

We are 29 mental health and addiction (MHA) agencies providing housing and supports to individuals recovering from mental health and addiction issues who were formerly homeless or at risk of homelessness. Together we collectively own, manage or rent 4400 units of housing either under social housing or rent supplement programs. We assess progress in ending homelessness as measured in specific areas.

HOUSING: WHY IS THIS IMPORTANT?

SaFe and affordable housing is key to health and well being of Toronto residents. Households must spend 30% or less of their income on housing, for it to be considered affordable. Expenditure of 50% or more greatly increases the risk of homelessness.
